BACKGROUND:

Digital transformation affects all aspects of public life. Artificial intelligence (AI)-driven technology in particular is increasingly being utilised by companies and public authorities to assist in providing services and making decisions. The results can be significant for the functioning of democracy: along with far-reaching benefits for human development and organizational efficiency, the use of AI systems can impact individuals' enjoyment of their human rights, including rights such as freedoms of expression and peaceful assembly that underpin democracy; algorithmic decision-making can insulate policymakers from responsibility for actions and decisions they oversee; and AI tools can even lead to systemic changes in the information environment that affect democratic participation and citizens' access to accurate information. While discussions are ongoing in multiple fora about managing AI's impacts on human rights, the conversation on how AI will and should impact democratic

institutions is less well-developed. Ensuring that human rights and democracy are strengthened and not undermined by AI is one of the key factors that will define the world we live in.

EVENT OBJECTIVES

- Analyse the impact of AI on the functioning of democracy, including via impact on enjoyment of human rights.
- Explore how the conditions necessary for thriving democracies, including human rights protection, can be maintained while facilitating beneficial innovations from AI.
- Focus international attention on the need for coordinated and multi-stakeholder cooperation, rooted in democratic values, between governments and the private sector that ensures secure AI development benefiting everyone.
- Identify key ways AI affects the creation and spread of democracy-undermining propaganda, through the lens of propaganda related to Russia's war of aggression against Ukraine.
- Gather expert insight into recent key developments, existing policies and governance models, research, principles and strategies on artificial intelligence and democracy.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION

- The event aims to create space for frank discussions amongst members and experts on various intersections between artificial intelligence and democracy, including via human rights, at international, national and local levels.
- The event will provide participants with the opportunity to discuss the human rights implications and other challenges facing democracies in the AI ecosystem, and how to prevent, mitigate and respond to them in a rights-respecting manner amidst varying regional contexts.
- It will explore recent key developments, existing policies and governance models, research and principles on how to define 'rules of the road' for our digital age, grounded in inclusion, human rights, and the rule of law, in order to counter the special risks to the functioning of democracy stemming from AI.

- The event will bring together policymakers, practitioners and civil society members for a multistakeholder view of the impacts of AI on democracy and the norms they suggest, to be drawn largely from the UN HRC and the CoD perspectives.
- A report summarizing and analyzing the discussions held during the workshop will be made public by the Permanent Secretariat of the Community of Democracies following the event.
